Our Experience with Education

People with intellectual disabilities face many barriers to accessing education. In many places, we are separated from students without disabilities in 'special schools'. Sometimes governments call special schools 'inclusive' but they really are not.

Self-advocates all over the world want our right to inclusive education to be respected. This means that all students with and without disabilities should learn together and get good support.

Article 24 of the CRPD protects our right to education.

Our Rights

• It says that governments should make sure that children with disabilities can go to school.

 General Comment 4 of the CRPD explains more about our right to inclusive education.

 It says that inclusive education means changing the education system so that all children can learn together. "I dropped out of school because I'm not understanding what the teachers are saying.

Big Problems We Face

Accessing Education

- Schools say they won't accept children with disabilities
- Children with disabilities go to separate or 'special' schools
- We don't get to go to university

In Schools

- Teachers don't think we can learn
- We don't get support to understand
- Other students do not accept us

What Needs To Change

What Governments Can Do

- Support Inclusive Education
 - Make laws to makes sure all children have inclusive education
 - Don't allow or spend money on separate "special education" systems
- Support Schools
 - Fund schools to get training about inclusion
 - Fund schools to make buildings accessible

"[My university] didn't require testing...we could have more time with our homework.

What Schools Can Do

- Make Classrooms Inclusive
 - Respect and value all students
 - Make sure everyone has time to understand and take part
 - Have a plan to stop bullying and discrimination
- Give Good Support
 - Train and support teachers to teach all students
 - Make sure we have the adjustments we need
 - Work with our families and organisations of people with disabilities (OPDs) that represent us
